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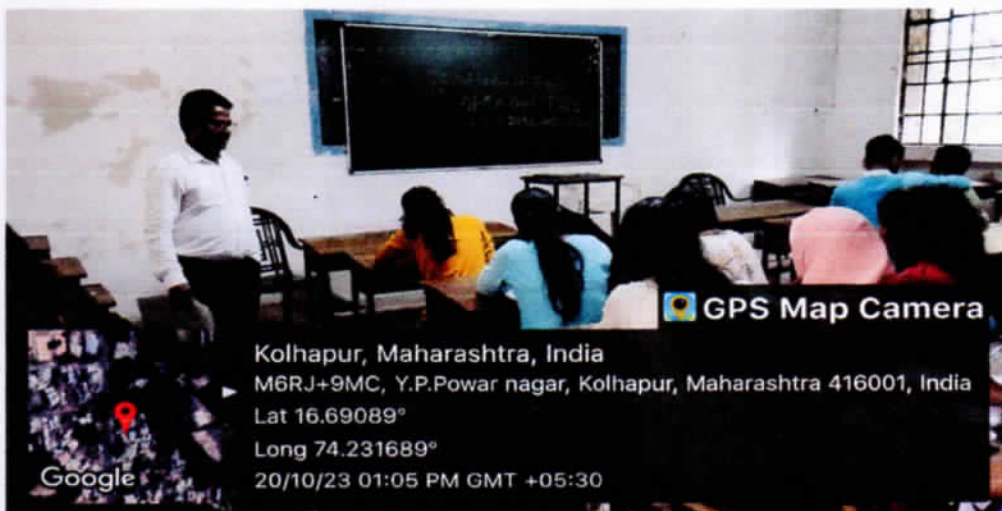
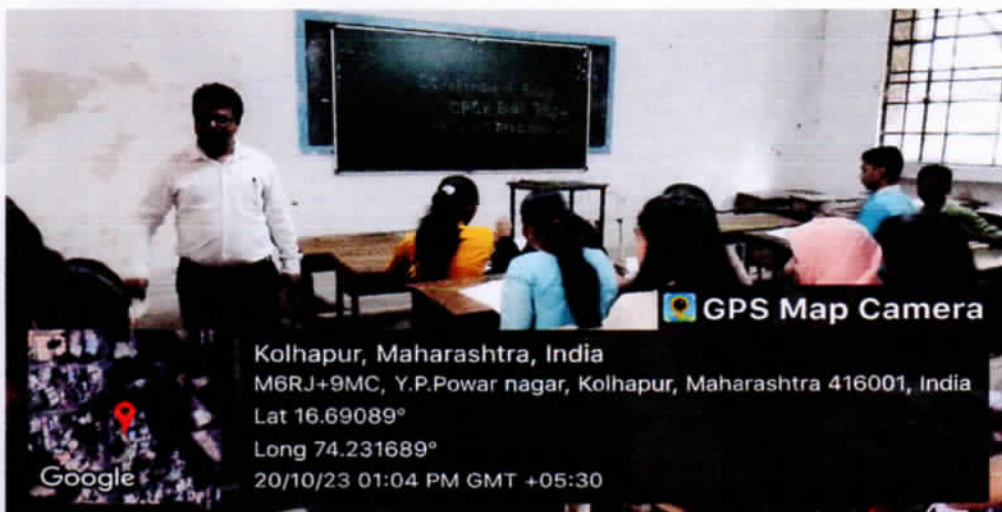
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- Title of Activity :** **Students Centric Learning: Open Book Test**
